Nineteen members and one guest met at the home of Mrs. Bell for the first institute meeting in 1947.

Mrs. Patterson presiding, opened the meeting by the singing of O'Canada and the repeating of the Institute Creed in unison. The Secretary read the minutes of the Annual Meeting with a small correction. These minutes were adopted. The Treasurer's report showed a balance as at the end of Nov of \$90.09, receipts in Dec \$5.13, expenses \$34.34, balance \$60.88. Mrs. MacFarlane seconded this report.

Letter read from Miss Ross, matron at hospital, acknowledging with thanks on behalf of the patients and herself, the lovely gift of flowers sent them at Christmas.

Mrs. Spicer reported on the purchase of these flowers, said they were lovely, that the florist gave her the very best he had. She moved that this bill be paid. Mrs. Wilson seconded, carried.

Mrs. MacFarlane, reporting for Post-War Work, asked that old clothing be gathered to be sent to the Unitarian Relief Committee, and asked the members if they could, to bring quilt blocks to the next meeting, as she was making a quilt for this relief work. All the members promised and she also reminded us that the Post-War project for Feb was an outfit for a small child.

Mrs. MacDonald reported that a member of the Council informed her that, in early spring, work would be commenced on the cemetery, this being the result of a request presented to the Council by the different organizations headed by the W.I. for the improvement of the cemetery.

Mrs. Patterson welcomed our guest, Mrs. Phillips, who later in the evening joined our institute.

A baby cup was presented to Mrs. MacMillan as a gift for her baby daughter. Mrs. MacMillan thanked the ladies for the cup and also for their note of good wishes.

Mrs. McFetridge read a letter from Mrs. Newcombe in connection with handicraft, outlining the work being done by the institutes.

Mrs. Swallow announced that she was going to Edmonton to the W.R.A.C. and asked if anyone had any complaints that they wished to put before the conference. She was asked to enquire about the release of children's underwear.

Mrs. Patterson discussed the need of having a good bank balance and that it was hoped that in the near future a recreation centre and other much needed projects would be undertaken. The Women's Institute wants to be ready to do their part in assisting with any worthy cause. Members were asked to put out feelers as to what the other organizations were doing, perhaps we could coordinate with them and together sponsor something worthwhile as a means of making money.

Mrs. Thomson read the year's program as drawn up by herself and her committee, with a few changes. This program was approved on a motion by Mrs. Kowensky. Seconded by Mrs. Spicer. Carried.

Mrs. Patterson then introduced Alice O'Brien and Stanley Pearcy, turning the meeting over to them. Alice played several pieces on the piano which was a perfect prelude to the most interesting talk Stanley gave on the purpose object of Teen Town. Stanley thanked the ladies for the invitation to come and talk at their meeting, saying at first that he just could not understand it as was the first time that anyone had asked them or taken an interest in Teen Town, except for work or raising money, which they were always glad to do. He outlined the purpose of Teen Town as a means for youth to get together in clean, wholesome, enjoyment in order to become good citizens. He asked the parents to be more understanding with their children and to take a greater interest in their doings. He spoke of their paper or radio program, film nights, dancing and most of all of the great need of a recreation centre. Mrs. Patterson expressed the opinion of us all when she said that she thought it was the most interesting talk we have ever had. We all felt that when Stanley was done talking that we wanted to do so much for our youth. Mrs. Kowensky moved a vote of thanks to Stanley and Alice,

Mrs. Welsh seconded.

Mrs. Phillips joined as a new member. Eleven paid their dues.

On a motion by Mrs. Ward, seconded by Mrs. Thomson, the meeting was adjourned.

Feb. 1947 Minutes of the February Meeting of the Grande Prairie Women's Institute

On Feb 6th, 19 members of the Women's Institute and 2 guests met at the home of Mrs. Thomson for the monthly meeting. Mrs. Patterson, the President, presiding. After the singing of O'Canada the Institute Creed was repeated in unison. The minutes of the Jan meeting were read and adopted. The Treasurer's report showed a balance as at the end of Dec of \$60.88, receipts in Jan \$14.35, expenses \$11.38, balance \$63.85. Mrs. Bishop seconded this report. A letter was read from Mrs. Manley, who, because of the coming of a welcome event finds it necessary to resign from all outside activities. Mrs. Patterson read a letter from Mr. W.J. Fleming in connection with the health bulletin, enquiring if the Institute would care to have any copies. The 1947 programs so artistically prepared by Mrs. Manley were distributed. The Secretary was advised to write Mrs. Manley thanking her for the programs and expressing our regrets in losing so valuable a member; also our good wishes. A letter is also to be written to Mr. Fleming informing him that the members of the Institute would be pleased to receive copies of the Health Bulletin.

Pamphlets on "How to prevent accidents", from the Robin Hood Flour Mills, were distributed.

A question was asked as to what the convenors' evening on the program meant. Mrs. Patterson explained that each convenor was to give a five minute talk on recent events or on the subject they were convening.

Mrs. Morton wrote advising to send shipment to her for the Unitarian Relief Work.

Mrs. Wilson reported on Post-War Work, discussed the packing of boxes for the U.R.W. and asked that all articles be sent to Mrs. MacFarlane by the end of Feb.

It was decided not to make slippers from the felt hats but to send them as they are.

It was moved by Mrs. Thomson and seconded by Mrs. Welter that \$5.00 be allocated to the Secretary for necessary expenses.

Mrs. Swallow reported on the conference of the Women's Regional Advisory Board, saying there was not much to report. Prices of clothing have been going up and that children's underwear would soon be on the market in good supply.

Mrs. MacDonald showed lantern slides of Mrs. Crawford's beautiful garden and of Hudson Hope.

Mr. O'Brien and Mr. Wright were introduced to give us a talk on the swimming pool. Mr. O'Brien told of the work being done by the Kinsmen in connection with the swimming pool, the amount of money on hand and the help needed. Mr. Wright suggested that the Institute take one project for the swimming pool as their goal, with a diving board suggested. Mrs. Patterson thanked Mr. O'Brien and Mr. Wright for their interesting talk on the pros and cons of the swimming pool.

Mrs. Patterson next asked for suggestions for means of making money. After some discussion Mrs. MacDonald made a motion that we have a raffle for groceries, a sale of home cooking

and a tea on March 15th. Mrs. Ward seconded; carried. Mrs. MacMillan suggested that we also put nylon hose in the raffle as an added attraction. Mrs. MacDonald offered to take charge of the raffle, assisted by Mrs. MacMillan and Mrs. Figgers. Mrs. Thomson offered their store to display the raffle. Mrs. Patterson is to ask for the church basement and dishes. Mrs. Stoehr is to make the posters. Mrs. MacDonald to see to the advertising, on club calendar, screen and press.

Mrs. Welter read the revised handicraft prepared by herself and Mrs. McFetridge.

The social evening for March was discussed. Mrs. MacDonald, Mrs. MacMillan and Mrs. Figgures were put in charge of the entertainment.

Mrs. Carroll moved a vote of thanks to Mrs. MacDonald for the picture slides.

Five (5) members paid their fees. Two new members.

Mrs. Bell moved the meeting adjourn, Mrs. Spicer seconded. Mrs. Bishop and Mrs. Ward assisted the hostess in serving a delicious lunch which brought an interesting meeting to a close.

Mar. 1947 Minutes of the March Meeting of the Grande Prairie Women's Institute

In the absence of Mrs. Patterson, the President, Mrs. Wishart, Vice-President, presided. The meeting opened with the repeating of the Institute Creed. The minutes of the Feb meeting were read and adopted as read. The Treasurer's report showed a balance as at the end of Jan of \$63.85, receipts in Feb \$8.85, expenses \$5.25, balance \$67.45. Mrs. MacFarlane seconded this report.

Arrangements for the St. Patrick's Tea to be held Mar. 15th were completed. A white elephant and novelty sale, home cooking table, raffle of grocery hamper and nylon hose. Mrs. Swallow to convene the tea; Mrs. MacDonald on the decorating; Mrs. Bell and Mrs. Thomson on home cooking; Mrs. Welter and Mrs. McFetridge on the white elephant sale; Mrs. Stoehr and Mrs. Ireland novelty; Mrs. Wilson, Mrs. Henning, Mrs. Kowensky and Mrs. MacFarlane in the kitchen; Mrs. Spicer and Mrs. Carroll to pour tea; Mrs. MacDonald in charge of the raffle; six ladies appointed to wait on tables; each member to donate to the different tables. Seconded by Mrs. Swallow. Carried.

Mrs. Kowensky read a letter from Mrs. Morton in connection with the Lady Tweedsmuir Silver Cup competitions that will be presented to the Institute members of Canada for the Best Tweedsmuir Village Book, the best shopping bag and an essay on the book I most enjoyed.

A letter from the local W.C.T.U. in connection with the 3rd beer license in Grande Prairie was discussed at length.

All business being completed, Mrs. Wishart turned the meeting over to the committee in charge of the entertainment, with games and shrieks of laughter as each member acted her part of the young girl or the stately grandmother. A hilarious hour of fun was enjoyed. Then we proceeded to the dining room, where, from an artistically layed table we each helped ourselves to a lovely jellied salad, bread and butter, followed by delicious angle food cake. June 1947 Minutes of the June Meeting of the Grande Prairie Women's Institute

The monthly meeting of the Grande Prairie Women's Institute was held at the home of Mrs. W. Sharpe on June 11th with fifteen members and one guest present. Mrs. Patterson presiding. The meeting opened with the singing of O'Canada followed by the Institute Creed.

The Secretary played hooky and went to a picnic, arriving back late. Mrs. Kowensky kindly acted as Secretary and read the minutes of the May meeting; these were adopted as read.

The Treasurer's report was read and seconded by Mrs. Bishop.

Mrs. Spicer reported on the flowers sent to Mrs. Howard at Sexsmith and how much they were appreciated.

Mrs. Patterson said that Mrs. O'Brien reported purchasing a diving board for the swimming pool at a cost of \$175.00. As \$200.00 was earmarked for the swimming pool we decided to keep the remaining \$25.00 as a nest egg.

Mrs. Patterson also explained the voting of Mrs. Wishart's expenses for attending the Convention as it was omitted at the May meeting.

It was suggested that a gift be purchased for Mrs. Manley's baby in acknowledgment of her work in preparing the program books. Mrs. Spicer to attend to it.

Mrs. Patterson reported on the suggestion that Mrs. Morton be sent as a delegate to Amsterdam and that it was almost the unanimous wish of the convention that she be sent. As the A.C.W.W. had been asked for plans for feeding it is very nice to feel that the Alberta Women's Institute can voice their opinions through their Provincial President. It will therefore be necessary that each branch contribute generously to Mrs. Morton's expenses. It was decided that the Grande Prairie Institute members give at least 50¢, taking the balance from the treasury to make a total of \$25.00. Donations are to be left with Mrs. Flanagan, Treasurer, as near to July 1st as possible and to be sent to Mrs. McGorman not later than July 10th. This suggestion was made on a motion by Mrs. McFetridge, seconded by Mrs. Figgures, carried.

Mrs. Patterson announced the date of the Constituency Conference as June 18th at Rio Grande. Transportation was discussed and Mrs. Figgures consented to take charge of this. It was at first thought that a bus might be possible but when phoning and finding out the cost would be \$50.00 and that they could accommodate 30 passengers this was decided against. Those wishing to go and anyone knowing who could take their car was to get in touch with Mrs. Figgures. Mrs. McFetridge said the ribbons for the handicraft were not ready and asked for volunteers to help her get them ready.

The Cancer Fund had been chosen as the provincial project of the W.I. Over a ton of clothing besides gifts and foods had been sent overseas from Alberta's W.I. In the future parcels were to be sent privately or through C.A.R.E. Mrs. Patterson was again elected as District Director as Mrs. Johnson from the north side of the river was unable to act due to circumstances over which she has no control. Mrs. Patterson was also appointed delegate to the Federated Convention. Calgary's W.I. members put on a play, Growth of

the W.I. This was very good and told of a blind lady. Mrs. Johnson, President of Grimshaw W.I. gave a little talk on W.I. work. She mentioned a special handicraft display that they were taken to see at the Allied Art Council Exhibit at Western Canada High School. The quilt winning first prize was sent to Lady Reading of England who showed much interest in W.I. work. Special mention was given on several occasions to the Peace River districts. It was a friendly but busy convention. All resolutions were dealt with. There was one minute silence for our departed members and of course the singing of O'Canada and Salute to the Flag.

Mrs. Patterson next welcomed our guest and introduced her. Mrs. Figgures Sr. of Crawford Park, Manitoba, and asked her to tell us something of their W.I. She told of the work of the Supervisor in the organizing of branches and of their sewing and scrap book of quilts. She also extended greetings from her members and Mrs. Patterson sent greetings to her members from Grande Prairie W.I.

Mrs. Kowensky was appointed delegate to the conference at Rio Grande with Mrs. Bouchor as alternate. (The wayward returned).

Mrs. MacDonald reported on cemetery work that is going forward and that the Town has set aside a goodly sum of money for this purpose. She also reported on a needy family. Mrs. McFetridge and Mrs. MacDonald were asked to attend to the case and anyone having any old clothing were asked to send it to these ladies as soon as possible. She also reported on the Greece Relief drive and brought up the matter of the Red Cross meeting to arrange for the Blood Donor Clinic in July. Mrs. Spicer consented to represent the W.I. at this meeting.

Mrs. Patterson now introduced the guest speaker, Mr. Pratt, who took for his subject insurance. He spoke of the origin of insurance dating back to 1660 when it developed as a pledge between owners of ships. At first it was just a pledge, no premium or policy. Then they thought members would be more interested in business insurance. Household furniture, automobiles, hail until today where you can have all your belongings insured, even your pen and pencil set. Many facts were unfolded that had not been known before about insurance. Mrs. Patterson thanked Mr. Pratt for his splendid talk and how much it was enjoyed by all. Mrs. MacDonald moved a hearty vote of thanks to Mr. Pratt, Mrs. Wilson seconded.

Mrs. Swallow moved and Mrs. Bishop seconded that the meeting adjourn. A lovely lunch was then served by the hostess assisted by Mrs. Carroll and Mrs. Hnatiuk which brought our meeting to a close until we meet again in Sept.

The entertainment committee, assisted by the hostess, served a delicious salad with biscuits and cookies supplied by the members. All voted it a bountiful lunch.

Mrs. Wishart then thanked the committee for a splendid evening's entertainment. So ended another of our social meetings, feeling that "a little nonsense now and then is refreshing".

Twenty members of the Grande Prairie Women's Institute met at the home of Mrs. Spicer for their monthly meeting. Mrs. Wishart, the president, called the meeting to order and all repeated the Institute Creed.

Minutes of the March meeting were read and adopted. The Treasurer's report showed the Feb balance \$32.85, receipts in March \$266.85, expenses \$117.15, balance \$181.70. Mrs. Henning seconded this report.

Mrs. Hnatiuk brought thanks from Mrs. Welter, who was unable to attend, on behalf of herself and baby boy for spoon gift from W.I. members.

Mrs. Wishart reported on the executive meeting at her home to arrange for cancer campaign and that a W.I. pin along with a note of good wishes from W.I. members were presented to Mrs. Stewart who was leaving Grande Prairie. Twelve (12) Federated pins were ordered.

A letter was read from Teen Town asking that a representative from the Women's Institute be appointed to attend their meetings, give advice and help in their work. Mrs. Hnatiuk appointed Mrs. Kowensky as our representative until July. Mrs. Kowensky kindly accepted the appointment. A discussion as to making a donation to Teen Town followed. Mrs. Bishop said she thought that Teen Town wished to try to manage by themselves for a while at least, but after much discussion a small donation was decided on. It was decided suggested as there was so much doing now to table it until the fall.

Mrs. MacDonald reported on the executive meeting to arrange for the cancer campaign and read a letter from Mr. Talbot. Mrs. MacDonald was appointed as convenor, with a committee of 3. Mrs. Kowensky said that she would take over radio publicity and Mrs. Hnatiuk offered to help and Mrs. Figgures as treasurer.

Mrs. Ward was appointed on program committee roll call, book I most enjoyed.

Mrs. Swallow offered to have the May meeting as Mrs. Stewart, who was to have it, left Grande Prairie. Mrs. Solden to take the December meeting that was to be Mrs. Swallow's. Mrs. Cave,

Mrs. Wishart thanked Mrs. Ward for her very lovely selection of music and each of the artists for their part in very enjoyable musical entertainment. Federated pins were distributed.

While lunch was being prepared a letter was read from the Canadian Legion re: proposed skating rink. Mrs. Bouchor reported that \$44.10 was realized; expenses \$2.86; \$40.41 was turned over to the Arena Fund. Mrs. Hnatiuk and Mrs. Wilson worked with Mrs. Bouchor arranging this tea. Correspondence read.

A letter from Mrs. Morton, outlining the Tweedsmuir Contest, clothing and food parcels for Europe, library books available for Institute use and that Christmas cards could be purchased from the Unitarian Service Committee at \$1.00 for sixteen. This money is to be used for needy European children.

A letter from Mr. Talbot, Canadian Cancer Society executive for Alberta outlining the work being done by this society.

Also a letter from the Canadian National Institute of the Blind asking for the support of the Women's Institute in a campaign for funds to aid in this great work of helping the blind. The standing committee were reminded to bring their reports to the next meeting. Roll call was answered by "who should hold the purse strings". The answers were almost unanimous, that they should be held 50-50.

Mrs. Figgures moved that the meeting adjourn. The dainty lunch served by the hostess, assisted by Mrs. Bouchor and Mrs. Orchuk brought 1948's meetings to a successful end.

She spoke of conditions under German occupation. Before the war Denmark was a garden of Eden, with good social welfare work. At the beginning inhabitants were fairly well treated under German rule, with conditions worsening as time went on. Finally Danish underground movement grew, led by messages received over British radio. The King became more popular. The right to think, believe and speak freely had gone. In '43 an open breach came. People were helped to flee to Sweden. Sabotage increased. In '44 all Danish policemen were arrested and sent to concentration camps. The Gestapo took over with some Danish collaborators. Mrs. Kristianson, herself, once just escaped a bullet meant for her, for her assistance to the resistance movement. A general strike in '44 lasted 4 days. After liberation, candles were lit in all windows and British flags were seen everywhere. Mrs. Kristianson passed around Danish pamphlets. Mrs. MacDonald moved, Mrs. Stoehr seconded, a very hearty note of thanks for this fascinating talk. Carried.
