Secretary's Book, Grande Prairie W.I. Dec./41

December

Mrs. Kowensky reporting on Community Welfare reported assistance given to a local family in clothing and milk supplied for several weeks. Odd gifts of clothing were given where needed. Moved. Adoption.

Educational report given by Mrs. Harris showed that field had not been over looked – two meetings have been devoted to educational topics. Adoption of which was moved by Mrs. Harris.

Mrs. Patterson reporting on Legislation and International Relations suggested value in keeping a scrap book on international relations; suggested value in study of Rowell Sirois Report and other outstanding topics. Moved the adoption of her report.

Publicity report of Mrs. Hnatiuk gave her no opportunity except to say she had carefully done her work through the year. She then moved the adoption of this report.

Mrs. Sharpe reporting for the waiting room, 67 patients for the year, from widely separated points. She suggested placing literature from the Baby Clinic in the W. room for mothers to take home. Adoption of this report moved by Mrs. Sharpe.

Mrs. Peebles mentioned the gifts to the hospital during the year of flowers and fruit and offered her service in selection of gifts this year.

The library report by Mrs. Charters showed total books 610, total receipts 34.05 – total expend. 34.05 – balance 18.07. monthly circulation 100. She then moved adoption of this report.

Mrs. Charters then reported on the Publicity Program from the moment it was thought of by Mrs. Scarth to the time of becoming a reality. Appreciation was expressed for generosity of C.F.G.P. The secretary then read her annual report and moved it's adoption.

Mrs. Scarth then gave a short report, mentioning War Savings canvass last year, salvage work, and her privilege of attending the convention last year.

Mrs. Scarth expressed appreciation of the executive, directors and members for their year's work. She concluded her remarks with a short article entitled "The Farmer's Wife has Time for Everything", greatly enjoyed by all. Mrs. Scarth also expressed appreciation of the <u>Herald Tribune</u>, C.F.G.P., Telephone Staff and Canadian Utilities.

Mrs. Patterson, as Vice-President, expressed appreciation of our splendid year's work under Mrs. Scarth's capable and entertaining leadership. The adoption of all reports seconded by Mrs. Spicer.

New Business included report on Rink question. The Town having taken action for better supervision.

Mrs. Scarth called for a report of Library committee. Mrs. Charters explained the

success met with when approaching the Town Council, told of entire work of library to date, and said they now had the petition ready to be signed by rate payers to make it a town library.

The President then brought up the idea of opening homes to soldiers. Moved by Mrs. Harris sec. by Mrs. Kowensky that Mesdames Wishart, Card and Scarth, approach Major Younger to see the need of such entertainment and its possibilities.

Mrs. Scarth read a letter from Mrs. W.J. Thompson which all members appreciated.

Mrs. Hnatiuk moved a note of thanks to the executive of last year. Sec. by Mrs. Sharpe.

Mrs. Sharpe mentioned a needy family and offered to investigate.

Meeting adjourned on motion by Mrs. Card. Surprise won by Mrs. Harris brought 70ϕ . Tea money brought \$1.95.

Mrs. Wishart reported on entertainment of soldiers at Christmas Dinner. There were 40 homes opened to the boys and about 60 boys entertained. A letter of thanks from Maj. Younger was read, thanking the committee and hostesses for their work.

Program committee had outlined a splendid program for the coming year, which was presented by Mrs. Patterson whose motion of adoption was seconded by Mrs. Swallow.

Mrs. O'Brien reported for the Red Cross, expressed thanks to the faithful workers who assist in packing, cutting etc. She also gave an impressive list of finished garments, shipped in the past two months.

Mrs. Charters' library report showed balance of 13.36 – mentioned progress of petition to rate payers and coming vote. Mrs. Scarth expressed appreciation of Mrs. Charters' year's work.

A letter read from Lymburn requesting help for a needy family was given our welfare convener, Mrs. McDonald, all members to assist if they could in finding garments suitable, Mrs. McDonald to draw on us if need be for funds as moved by Mrs. O'Brien sec. Mrs. Blair.

Letters were read from the recipients of ditty bags, also a letter of good wishes and encouragement from our const. convener Mrs. Williams.

Mrs. Patterson reported the case of a child at Valhalla who has lost his hearing through accident. It was decided to keep in mind Dr. Levy's next visit and meanwhile to enquire of him the cost of an examination for the child and the possibilities of institutional care in case of continued deafness. Also to write Mrs. Brekke re: possibilities of the child being brought to G. Prairie for examination.

The President brought up the matter of further contribution to Merchant Marine and on motion of Mrs. O'Brien sec. Mrs. Swanston we were to send a further amount of \$80.00.

After a vote on motion of Wishart sec. by Charters it was decided to drop discontinue the War S. Stamp surprise packet for the present.

Moved by Mrs. Hnatiuk, sec. by Mrs. Tracy, that provincial dues be paid.

Mrs. Scarth then called on Mrs. Tracy who delighted all present with her entertaining book review on "The Timeless Land" by Eleanor Dark. This was a most unusual and interesting account of early settlement in Australia. A letter from Mr. Carl Johnson expressed thanks to members for magazines. Several letters were read re: the Loberg boy and the matter tabled till Dr. Levy's next visit.

Miss Dorothy Patterson, accompanied by Miss Elwood, delighted us with a solo of "The White Cliffs of Dover". Mr. A.M. Reid, guest speaker, was then introduced and we were treated to an address on Persia. This was an account of his trip to Persia and many personal experiences, also insight into the native way of life and religion. The treasurer, Mrs. Swallow, in her report showed a balance on hand of 86.52. Mrs. Swallow moved and Mrs. Card seconded the adoption of this report. Carried.

Mrs. Swallow collected some more membership fees and also the talent money from the teas held by each member. Although there is still more tea money to be collected, \$27.00 was handed in. The ladies were glad to welcome a new member, Mrs. Dawes.

For an hour we were entertained with both vocal and piano solos and duets, also violin selections played by Mrs. Ian McIntosh. Mrs. The President thanked the Club for so kindly entertaining us each year, and Mrs. Newton in particular as this was her last evening with us, after many years.

A delicious tea lunch was then served by the hostess and committee.

The Women's Institute met at the home of Mrs. M. Swallow June 1st with sixteen members and four visitors present.

With Mrs. D. Patterson as Chairman the meeting was opened with "O Canada" followed by the Creed.

The minutes of the May meeting were read and adopted. In the absence of the Treasurer, the Treasurer's report was read by the Secretary, showing a balance on hand of \$29.35. Moved by Mrs. Sharpe, seconded by Mrs. Wilson that the Treasurer's report be adopted. Carried.

Mrs. Wilson reported that a tea had been given in honour of Mrs. Loiselle on May 8 at the home of Mrs. D.O. Carroll. Mrs. Loiselle was also presented with a silver birch cup & saucer.

Two letters were read from Mrs. L. Williams with regard to the forthcoming conference in Beaverlodge on June 17th. A card from Mrs. Morton, expressing thanks for fur received from our W.I. was also read.

Mrs. McFarlane reported two more quilts donated, and more wool received for ditty bags. Moved by Mrs. McFarlane, seconded by Mrs. Spicer that report be adopted. Carried. The wool was then distributed to volunteers to knit socks and mitts.

Mrs. McDonald, Welfare Convener, being absent, her report of a burnt out family in Bad Heart District was read. Mrs. McDonald told of collecting cooking utensils, dishes, pillows, etc and sending them to Mrs. Parker. Moved by Mrs. Sharpe, seconded by Mrs. Bell that Mrs. McDonald's report by adopted. Carried. Mrs. Wishart requested that someone be appointed to take her place on the Hostess Hut Comm. but finally consented to remain until Sept. as the Hostess Hut was to be closed during the summer months.

A pleasant break in the routine was a little group singing, conducted by Mrs. N. Miller.

Business of the Conference was then taken up and the Secretary was appointed as delegate. The business of the evening being concluded, Mrs. Patterson called on Mrs. J.H. Hunter to give us the story of E. Sartain who painted the beautiful still-life pictures displayed in the room. E. Sartain is an English woman artist who came to Canada just before the war in 1939, and is now living in Vancouver. Three of the Royal Family have pictures by E. Sartain, two being Queen Mary and Princess Alice. Among the pictures were "Christmas Roses", "Pansies", "Snowdrops", "Gardenia".

Mr. Melsness, guest speaker, was then called on for his paper on citizenship. He chose "the flag" as his subject. He spoke of the flag as a symbol, which we need especially now. Our flag, though called the Union Jack, should be called the Union flag as it is only a "Jack" when flying from the jack-staff of a man-of-war. The history of the forming of the Union Flag was told, also its various uses.

Moved by Mrs. Swanston that we adjourn.

Following a few questions and answers about the Flag and "O Canada", Mrs. Patterson thanked Mr. Melsness for his instructive talk. Moved by Mrs. Swanston that we adjourn.

September 1944

The Women's Institute met at the home of Mrs. H. McDonald on Thur. Sept. 7th at 8 p.m. for their regular monthly meeting, Mrs. D.W. Patterson presiding in the absence of the President, Mrs. D.O. Carroll.

Mrs. L. Kowensky acted as Secretary in place of Mrs. Sharpe who was ill.

Mrs. Patterson led the members in repetition of the Club Woman's Creed after which the minutes were read and approved.

Mrs. A. Wilson gave a brief report of the handicraft demonstration at the Constituency Conference held in June.

Mrs. McFetridge kindly consented to act as Hostess Hut convener.

Mrs. Hnatiuk, Treasurer, gave her report which was seconded by Mrs. A. Wilson.

Carried.

Mrs. Patterson told of the Navy League meeting which had been called and which she represented the W.I. She explained the work of the Navy League and asked for a volunteer to take charge of the sale of memberships to this worthy organization. Mrs. H. Minutes of the February Meeting of the Women's Institute

Feb. 1945 Twenty-two members and two visitors met at the home of Mrs. J. Thomson on Feb 1st. The meeting was opened with the singing of "O Canada" followed by the Institute Creed. Mrs. Patterson, the president, presiding. The minutes of the January meeting were read and adopted.

The treasurer's report read \$37.62 as at the end of December, \$14.95 receipts in January and \$43.09 expenses, leaving a balance of \$9.48.

Correspondence.

Six letters read from soldiers who received ditty bags at Christmas, these letters expressed sincere thanks and appreciation of the contents in each bag – all hoping the war would be over by next Christmas and all back home.

A letter to Mrs. McFarland from Mrs. Morton acknowledging the wonderful box of clothing sent for European Relief, also fur and leather received throughout 1944.

A letter from Mrs. J. Simmie asking for details re the Memorial Hall. This letter was handed to Mrs. Kowensky to reply to.

Letter from I.O.D.E. asking for donations to the Book Fund for the Armed Forces.

Mrs. Patterson read parts of a letter from Mrs. Dow, President of Federated Women's Institute, urging the members to beware of inflation after Victory, and stated that necessities for hot lunches for school children can be procured by applying to the War Time Price and Trade Board.

Mrs. Wilson reported on war work at two quilts and six pair men's socks sent to the Navy League.

Mrs. McFetridge reporting on the Hostess Hut, said she had nothing definite to report as a change was being made in the management of the hut, and a special meeting was called for Feb 7th to meet the new manager and discuss new plans and arrangements for entertainment. She asked for the opinion of the members on the proposed new arrangement, for each organization to entertain once a week in preference to the present arrangement of hostess for each evening – all were in favour of once a week entertaining.

Mrs. MacMillan reporting on the questionnaire in connection with reconstruction work, that twenty forms were distributed and collected duly filled in, with many useful suggestions of improvements added, these forms were returned to the Legion. The object of these questionnaires was chiefly to get an idea of the amount of work anticipated during the post-war period and whether an estimate could be made of the number of jobs that could be provided for returning men.

Moved by Mrs. Wilson and seconded by Mrs. Hnatiuk that a vote of thanks be given Mrs. MacMillan on the splendid program prepared by her and distributed at the meeting.

A motion by Mrs. Hnatiuk that a letter be written the I.O.D.E. in reply to their request re Book Fund, informing them that each member contribute individually as our finances were too low to make a worthwhile contribution. Mrs. Carroll seconded the motion.

A motion by Mrs. McFarland that clothing be collected for Russian Relief, clothing to be left at the Red Cross Room or Fleming's Hardware. Seconded by Mrs. Swallow.

Mrs. Swallow made a motion that \$5.00 be given Mrs. Wilson for War Work. Seconded by Mrs. Spicer.

Moved by Mrs. Bell and seconded by Mrs. Kowensky that greetings and best wishes from the Grande Prairie Women's Institute be sent to the new Women's Institute to be formed at Crooked Creek at which our president will preside.

Mrs. Patterson asked for suggestions to be presented on the program at the Provincial Convention meeting in Edmonton. Moved by Mrs. Kowensky that a recommendation to bring compulsory per-marital health examination be presented. Mrs. Wilson seconded this motion. All motions were unanimously carried.

Mrs. Patterson then welcomed the visitors and new members. Eleven members paid

their fees with three of these being new members.

Mrs. Patterson introduced the guest speaker, Miss Campbell, Matron at the hospital. Miss Campbell gave a very interesting paper on venereal diseases with much discussion about the phases of the diseases. Mrs. Spicer moved a vote of thanks to Miss Campbell, Mrs. Stoehr seconded.

The president also voiced her appreciation to Miss Campbell for her very instructive discussion, assuring her of the cooperation of the Women's Institute in any way possible to the blotting out of this disease. The appreciation of all was shown by a hearty applause.

On a motion by Mrs. Swanson the meeting adjourned and it was agreed to meet for next month's meeting at the home of Mrs. MacMillan. The remainder of the evening was spent in friendly chat while we enjoyed the dainty lunch served by the hostess, assisted by Mrs. Bell and Mrs. Flanagan.

Minutes of the March Meeting of the Women's Institute

March 1945 With seventeen members present at the home of Mrs. MacMillan, Mrs. Patterson, the President, opened the meeting with the singing of O Canada followed by the Institute Creed.

The minutes of the February meeting were read and adopted as read.

In the absence of the treasurer, the secretary read the treasurer's report, which showed \$9.48 as at the end of January, receipts in February \$13.50, expenses \$5.57, leaving a balance of \$17.41. Mrs. Bishop seconded the adoption of this report.

A letter was read from a soldier received a ditty bag at Christmas. Mrs. MacDonald, reporting on the Relief for Russia stated that the response to the appeal for clothing was splendid, two large boxes were packed, filled with many good and useful articles of clothing, blankets, quilts and afghans. Special mention was made of the lovely layette donated by Miss Roberts' pupils in Grade 7 and Mrs. Devett. Also a good supply of lovely and useful baby and small children's clothing; 211 articles were counted, not including baby bonnets, vests, booties and various other knitted articles. She also mentioned the assistance given by Mr. Fleming and staff. It was moved by Mrs. Thomson and seconded by Mrs. Kowensky that a vote of thanks be given the ladies who packed these boxes and a letter of thanks be written to Mrs. Fredette for her valuable assistance, also to Mrs. Devett, Miss Roberts and Mr. Fleming and staff.

Mrs. McFarlane, War Work Convener, reported that one large parcel of leather was sent to Mrs. Morton. There were no other convener reports.

Mrs. Patterson told of organizing a Women's Institute Branch at Crooked Creek, and said how pleased she was to find such enthusiasm among the members of this new group.

The President then spoke of the pressing need of funds to carry on our work, asking for suggestions for ways and means to raise money. Many interesting suggestions were made, including: bean supper, raffle, telephone bridge, bingo, tea, talent money etc. On a motion by Mrs. Bishop, seconded by Mrs. McFetridge, it was decided to have a tea on March 17th, with a committee being formed to make arrangements for the tea. Mrs. MacDonald offered to convene it, Mrs. Bishop, Mrs. Reynolds, Mrs. Welton and Mrs. McFetridge offered to assist.

Another motion by Mrs. Thomson and seconded by Mrs. Carroll that we have a raffle in connection with the tea. Mrs. MacMillan and Mrs. Wilson kindly consented to take charge of the raffle in conjunction with the other members of the tea committee. The raffle is to consist of two or three hampers of groceries and a fruit cake. Tickets are to be sold at 10ϕ each and each member is to donate to the hampers some small donation of groceries. Mrs. Kowensky offered to make the cake if she could get the fruit. Mrs. MacMillan gave her a package of peel, others offered butter, fruit and eggs. Mrs. Thomson said we could use the window of the Thomson Hardware store to display the cake and hampers. Mr. Spicer was to be asked to ice the cake, Mrs. MacMillan and Mrs. MacDonald are to make the tickets and arrange for a place to hold the tea, Mrs. Welton to help with the decorating and Mrs. Stoehr to make the posters. \$5.00 was allowed for any expenditures deemed necessary. Other arrangements were left to the committee. All the members agreed to put their shoulder to the wheel and give it a turn to making this tea an all out effort. All motions and suggestions were unanimously approved.

The President gave a brief outline on the Council meeting of the Prov. Women's Institute which she attended in Edmonton. Her description of each representative made us feel that we were meeting and knowing them. She told of the splendid amount of War Work done by the Alberta Women's Institute throughout the year, that approximately \$22,000 was raised, with \$1,200 sent to the Jam-for-Britain Fund and \$1,800 for bombed out British areas. More quilts for Merchant Marines were needed. Post-war plans were discussed, X* (arrangements were being made for pre-marital health examinations) and plans for a convention to be held at the Macdonald Hotel in Edmonton about the end of May.

The Roll Call followed and caused many smiles and laughter as each member answered her name with "How I met my husband", with Mrs. Stoehr's answer thought to be the best.

Meeting adjourned on motion by Mrs. Wilson. A delightful lunch was served by the hostess, assisted by Mrs. Carroll and Mrs. McFetridge.

Minutes of the April Meeting of the Women's Institute

April 1945 On April 5th the monthly meeting of the Women's Institute was held at the home of Mrs. Kowensky with eighteen members and one visitor present. The meeting opened with the singing of O Canada followed by the Institute Creed.

Mrs. Patterson, the President, then introduced Mr. Stranatka, the guest speaker. Owing to another engagement it was necessary that Mr. Stranatka give his address in the early part of the evening. He took for his subject Better Homes and Gardens. First giving an outline on the duties of the District Agriculturalist of the large territory he has to cover to reach the five thousand farms under his supervision. He told of forming two junior clubs, of sending one-hundred sixteen men and six women to the harvest fields. He then discussed the beautifying of the home by giving care and attention to the lawn and garden, the advantage gained by sowing good lawn grass seed, recommending Kentucky Blue grass. The planting of shrub, ornamental and shade trees for best effect, shrub trees be planted in groups of three or four near the house or in corners and along the fence. He mentioned Spirea, Catoneaster, Honeysuckle and Lilac for ornamental trees, Flowering Crab, Mountain Ash and White Spruce for shade. He also advised to be on the look out for cut worms this spring as the moth butterfly was quite plentiful last fall. The president thanked Mr. Stranatka for his very interesting and instructive information. The appreciation of all present was shown by an applause.

The meeting continued with the reading of the March minutes; with one correction these minutes were adopted as read.

The treasurer's report followed, showing a balance as at the end of February of \$17.41. Receipts in March were \$165.76. Expenses were \$9.70. Balance \$173.47. \$152.51 of the amount was the net proceeds of the tea. Mrs. Swanston seconded the adoption of this report.

Correspondence consisted of letters in connection with the convention in Edmonton and a letter from Canadian Aid to Russia thanking us for the splendid boxes received, asked that we continue this worthy work but hold future shipment until advised. It was stated that ninety-eight cases of clothing were shipped in February at an approximate value of \$37,500.

Mrs. Patterson then thanked the committee and all the ladies who worked so well and willingly to make the tea a success. Mrs. McFetridge, Welfare Convener, reported packing boxes of clothing for a family near Sexsmith whose home was destroyed by fire.

Mrs. McFarlane reported that a quilt was sent with the Clothing for Russia Relief, she overlooked mentioning it in last month's report. Mrs. McFarland and Mrs. Wilson made this quilt themselves.

Mrs. Patterson then welcomed Mrs. Wishart and Mrs. Bouchor back, and Mrs. O'Brien as our guest, expressing a wish that she would become a member.

Mrs. Hnatiuk was appointed to represent the Women's Institute at Red Cross. The

spending of the money proceeds of the tea was discussed. It was decided that we make a donation to the War Emergency Fund – to the War Work Conveners, that the constituency fees be paid and some kept in reserve for future emergencies. Moved by Mrs. Spicer and seconded by Mrs. Welton that \$10.00 be given to the War Work Conveners. Mrs. Kowensky moved that the constituency fees be paid, Mrs. Bishop seconded. Mrs. Wilson made a motion that \$60.00 be sent to the War Emergency Fund. Mrs. Bouchor seconded this motion.

Mrs. Wilson seconded Mrs. Kowensky's motion that a letter of thanks be written to Mr. Spicer for icing the cake raffled at the tea.

The President asked for the opinion of the meeting whether a delegate from Grande Prairie should be sent to the convention in Edmonton. Moved by Mrs. Spicer and seconded by Mrs. Miller that a delegate be sent. Mrs. Spicer nominated Mrs. MacDonald as delegate and Mrs. Wishart seconded the nomination. Mrs. Kowensky moved that nominations cease, Mrs. Swanston seconded. Mrs. Miller made a motion that Mrs. Carroll be appointed alternate delegate to the convention, Mrs. Hnatiuk seconded. Mrs. Wilson seconded Mrs. Hnatiuk's motion that \$25.00 be given the delegate for expenses.

Mrs. Patterson read briefs from the Federated News and discussed the convention, hoping that each member would do her part in making it a success

The Blood Clinic was discussed for the purpose of recording the number of our members who took part. Eight ladies helped with the lunches, three in the capacity of nurses and two blood donors. The entertainment for the boys in uniform was discussed at length – it was finally decided to go ahead with the party as scheduled for April 10th. A committee was formed with Mrs. Hnatiuk as convener. Mrs. MacMillan, Mrs. Welton, Mrs. Ireland, Mrs. Bouchor and Mrs. Bishop to assist. Mrs. Welton moved that \$5.00 be spent if necessary on the dance. Mrs. Ireland seconded. All motions and suggestions were approved unanimously.

Mrs. O'Brien joined as a new member. Mrs. Miller moved the meeting adjourned.

A lovely lunch was served by the hostess, assisted by Mrs. Ireland and Mrs. Reynolds.

Minutes of the May Meeting of the Women's Institute

May 1945 At the home of Mrs. Patterson with 21 members of the Grande Prairie Women's Institute and 14 guests assembled for the May meeting. Mrs. Patterson, the President, presiding.

After the singing of O'Canada and the repetition of the Institute Creed the minutes of the April meeting were read; with a small correction these minutes were adopted as read.

The treasurer's report showed a balance of \$173.47 as at the end of March, receipts in April of \$9.90, expenses \$109.40, leaving a balance of \$73.97.

Mrs. Patterson extended a hearty welcome to the visitors, expressing great pleasure in having the ladies of the Women's Institute of Sexsmith with us.

There was no correspondence.

Mrs. Hnatiuk, convener of the Hostess Hut dance, reported that the dance was a much greater success than anticipated, that hot dogs, cake and coffee was served and enjoyed by all. She thanked the ladies of her committee and all the others who helped, making special mention of Miss McFetridge who typed all the invitations. She then made a motion that a letter of thanks be written to Miss McFetridge for this service. Mrs. Wilson seconded. Carried.

Mrs. McFarlane, reporting on War Work, said that 5 quilts (2 in March and 3 in April) and 5 pairs of socks were sent to the Navy League; 1 of these quilts donated by the South End Sewing Club. She said that she had received a donation of fur and leather for war work. She then read a letter from Mrs. Morton in connection with old felt hats, Mrs. Morton stating that old felt hats made splendid lining for Jerkins if cleaned and ironed flat. As there was no definite decision arrived at, this will be discussed at our next meeting. Mrs. McFarlane also reported that her supply of wool was about all used and more would be necessary for knitting for the ditty bags. It was moved by Mrs. McFetridge and seconded by Mrs. Spicer that \$5.00 be given the War Work Convener to purchase wool. Carried.

Mrs. Patterson spoke a few words on the convention, as there was no correspondence, or instructions we would proceed in the usual manner. She then introduced Mrs. MacMillan, constituency convener from Sexsmith. Mrs. MacMillan, in addressing the meeting, touched on many subjects of interest. As their meeting this month was their annual Grandmother's Day meeting it was held in the afternoon. This afforded them an opportunity to come to the Grande Prairie meeting. They said that there are 31 grandmothers and 3 great-grandmothers. She told of her visit to the Valhalla District W.I. and of her difficulties in getting there in a cream-truck through very bad roads. She was loud in her praise of the wonderful amount of work done by this small group, who have to overcome many difficulties in getting to their meetings. In speaking about the constituency conference she said that no definite date had been set but it was hoped that it would be about the end of June. She promised that the conference would not be all work and no play as some fun was arranged on the program, encouraged war work and that although the war in Europe was nearly over there was yet much to be done. This record was sent to Mrs. Patterson and will be heard over C.F.G.P. Friday May 11th with Mrs. Kowensky's broadcast.

It was moved by Mrs. Bell and seconded by Mrs. Kowensky that a plant be sent to Mrs. Swanson who is ill in hospital. Mrs. Spicer is to purchase the plant.

Mrs. Patterson reminded those who purchased cake from the Dance Committee to pay to Mrs. Hnatiuk.

Now the moment that we were anxiously awaiting arrived, when the President announced the Musical Club, introducing them with a few well chosen words. She then asked Mrs. Caldwell to carry on. We were fully rewarded for our wait, each number was enthusiastically applauded. The president expressed the appreciation of all in her thanks to the club for a delightful program.

Mrs. Manley is our new institute member.

Mrs. Miller moved that the meeting adjourn.

While refreshments were being prepared the members and guests mingled in friendly chat, then enjoyed the dainty lunch prepared by the hostess assisted by Mesdames Wilson, Welter, Hnatiuk and MacDonald.

The meeting opened with the singing of O'Canada followed by the Institute Creed being repeated in unison.

Minutes of the June meeting and special meeting were read and adopted as read.

Correspondence consisted of a letter of thanks from a member, a birthday card and greetings from Mrs. MacMillan, constituency convener. A letter from the Dept of Public Health in connection with a lecture trip through northern Alberta, where they will lecture on public health subjects, wished to know if the Grande Prairie Women's Institute would sponsor a meeting when they were her in Oct. After some discussion a motion was made by Mrs. Miller and seconded by Mrs. Welter that we sponsor this lecture. The secretary was advised to reply informing them of the decision of the meeting. Mrs. McFetridge offered to make enquiries about the possibility of securing Speke Hall for this occasion. A letter from the secretary of the Soldier's Civil Re-Establishment Committee asking this organization for the approval or otherwise of the appointment made at their meeting on July 13th of a representative of the Women's Institute. The president declared the approval of their appointment. Mrs. MacDonald gave a brief outline on the setup of this committee.

A quilt was on display, donated by the South End Sewing Club.

It was decided to celebrate our 21st birthday on Sept 28th at a tea for all members, past and present, at the home of the president, Mrs. Patterson. Arrangements were made with Mrs. Wishart to convene, Mrs. Welter offered to make the cake and Mrs. Miller to arrange a program.

Mr. Rogers, the guest speaker, was introduced next. He took for his subject "The Government Policy of Rehabilitation of the Armed Forces". He told of the arrangements and plans being made by the government and local boards for the future welfare of the returning men and women. The discussion and questions that followed proved what an interest the ladies of the Women's Institute feel toward the welfare of the returning forces.

While lunch was being prepared by the hostess, Mrs. Wishart and Mrs. Wilson, the members and guests chatted in reminiscence of early institute days, and Mrs. Roberts told of the scrap book her institute branch prepared for the ditty bags of clippings of items of interest from papers, and jokes and witty sayings and of the institute play.

The treasurer's report showed a balance as at the end of June of \$63.98, receipts in Sept \$8.00, expenses \$25.00, balance \$46.98. Mrs. Miller seconded the report.

Correspondence read.

A letter from the Dept of Public Health expressing thanks for our cooperation in sponsoring their lecture Oct 15th. Letters from the Officers of the Provincial Women's Institute, Mrs. Morton, Pres.; Mrs. Evans, Vice-Pres.; Mrs. Strong, Secy.; Mrs. McFarlane, Treas. and Mrs. Rogers, Pres. Navy League. These were chiefly letters of greetings and explaining this year's setup of the Prov. Women's Institute. The secretary was advised to write Mrs. Strong and reply to her questions. Also to enquire for the Annual Year Book, if it was sent free or was there a charge and if so, how much as we would like to have at least three.

Mrs. McFetridge reported that she had secured Speke Hall for the lecture on Public Health. Further, that at a meeting of the Hostess Hut Committee it was decided that the different organizations entertain the boys as before the holidays – this was tabled until some later date.

In the absence of Mrs. Wishart, Mrs. Patterson reported on the Birthday Tea. She said how very grateful she was to all who helped to make this tea the success that it was. She mentioned specially Mrs. Carroll who so graciously received the guests and attended to the Register Book, to Mrs. Welter for the lovely cake so artistically decorated and so delicious to eat, to Mrs. Wishart for the capable way in which she convened and to all her help, to the secretary for her report, Mrs. Miller for the musical program, asking her to extend appreciation to the artists who took part.

A motion made by Mrs. Welter, seconded by Mrs. Miller that Mrs. MacDonald be paid for stamps and stationery purchased in connection with the tea. Carried.

Mrs. McFarlane and Mrs. Wilson reported on war work. Mrs. McFarlane reported two quilts ready for shipment, one donated by the South End Sewing Club. Mrs. Wilson discussed the packing of ditty bags, mentioning that Mrs. McFarlane had purchased one dozen jig-saw puzzles and donated some chocolate bars. Mrs. Welter offered to make six cakes if the necessary ingredients were provided. Several members offered fruit, butter, eggs and sugar. Mrs. McFetridge and Mrs. MacMillan offered to make two cakes each, Mrs. Kowensky one. Mrs. Spicer two tins of cookies, Mrs. Thomson gave \$1.00, other donations of money and cakes were made later. The filling of the bags was arranged. On a motion made by Mrs. MacMillan, seconded by Mrs. Mrs. Kowensky, \$25.00 was voted to the war work conveners for ditty bag supplies and other war work. Carried. A discussion to hold a telephone bridge was tabled until next meeting.

Mrs. Kowensky reported on a letter from the late Mr. Berry in connection with the Princess Alice Fund. Mrs. Patterson explained that this fund arose from the wish of Princess Alice to use the money to be spent on a gift to her from the women of Canada on a scholarship fund. After due consideration a motion was made by Mrs. Thomson, sec. by Mrs. Swallow that \$5.00 be donated to this fund. Carried. The secretary is to enquire of Mrs. Strong through what channels this money be sent.

Mrs. Patterson next introduced the guest speaker, the Rev. Mr. Kitney. Mr. Kitney's subject, Youth Movement. One could readily understand how very interested Mr. Kitney is in the youth movement by the sincere way in which he delivered his talk. He compared the youth education of Hitler with that of Denmark. Hitler's youth education was the basis of his rise to power of destruction, while the youth education in Denmark is to further the development of better and beautiful things. In the Folk High Schools, poetry and folk songs are taught as a means to improve morale and a desire to get out and study the development other countries. They came to Canada to study our butter and bacon industry which proved to be of great benefit to them. Mrs. Patterson thanked Mr. Kitney for his most

interesting talk and the appreciation of all was shown by all the questions asked and our desire that he should talk some more.

Money making suggestions were discussed next, including telephone bridge, talent money, \$2.00 each member, a progressive tea and an all-nations dinner. A play was suggested as a new year's project. A motion was made by Mrs. Miller for a progressive tea. A motion was made by Mrs. MacMillan and seconded by Mrs. Wishart for telephone bridge. Carried. Nov. 23rd was set as the date, Mrs. MacMillan, Mrs. Miller and Mrs. Welter to convene. Mrs. Swallow moved that \$5.00 be spent on prizes. Seconded by Mrs. Sharpe.

She mentioned rationing, blackouts, clothing coupons, no silk stockings, more than 4 million homes damaged by bombs. Newspapers helped with special receipts for war-time foods. Many questions were asked. Mrs. Patterson thanked the speaker for her interesting talk.

Mrs. MacDonald gave a brief report on the meeting of the rehabilitation she attended. The general discussion she said was chiefly the efforts of the government for the betterment of our returning armed forces, to find suitable jobs for them and help them in every way possible to adjust themselves back to civilian life. Mrs. MacDonald moved to adjourn.

Minutes of the December Meeting of the Grande Prairie Women's Institute

Dec. 1945 On Dec. 6th nineteen members of the Women's Institute met at the home of Mrs. Carroll for their monthly meeting. After the singing of O'Canada the Institute Creed was repeated in unison.

The minutes of the November meeting were read. On a motion by Mrs. Wilson, seconded by Mrs. Spicer, the minutes were adopted as read.

The Treasurer's report showed a balance as at the end of October of \$22.24, receipts for Nov \$9.15, telephone bridge receipts \$62.50 – total receipts \$71.65, expenses for Nov \$21.99, leaving a balance of \$49.66.

Mrs. Patterson read a letter of appreciation from Mr. Cummings for the help given to the national clothing drive; 7,042 lbs of clothing was packed and shipped from Grande Prairie.

Mrs. Patterson then spoke on the telephone bridge and explained what seemed to make a difference of opinion in connection with the money contribution. She thanked the conveners for their success and made special mention of Miss Wilson who so artistically designed the score cards. The secretary was asked to write her a letter expressing our appreciation.

Mrs. McFetridge reported on the poppy sale, saying that Mrs. Hnatiuk, Mrs. Bouchor and herself sold poppies in the value of \$63.45, with this amount handed over to the Legion.

Mrs. Wilson reported on war work, that 3 quilts were sent to the Navy League and that there were 2 quilts on display: one from the South End Sewing Club and one from Mrs. MacMillan.

Mrs. Patterson reported on the demonstration by Mrs. Vera MacDonald, that owing to the very stormy weather there was an attendance of only 16. Those who came were amply rewarded, the demonstration was both interesting and instructive. She told of many short cuts in housekeeping to save steps for the housewife and included many useful and interesting things to make. There were also several receipts for cakes. Mrs. Kowensky moved that \$1.00 be given the caretaker and \$2.00 to the Church Board to cover expenses in connection with this demonstration. Mrs. Wilson seconded.

Mrs. MacMillan reported on the telephone bridge. 28 tables played and all who took part enjoyed themselves to the fullest. She thanked the members who helped, especially Mrs. Miller, whom, she said, did most of the organizing. Gross receipts amounted to \$62.50.

The president next called for the annual reports. The secretary summed up the year's activities, showing a very full year financially, socially and active. Mrs. Swallow seconded the annual report.

The treasurer's report also showed a busy year. \$335.01 was raised, \$265.01 was spent various worthy causes, leaving a balance of \$70.00. Mrs. Bishop seconded this report.

Mrs. Patterson spoke briefly on the year's work, thanking all for their cooperation. She said that she enjoyed the year's work to the utmost.

The standing committees each gave a very interesting report on their various activities. Mrs. Bishop reported on agriculture and Canadian industry, told of the interesting talk by Mr. Stranatka on agriculture and Mrs. MacDonald's demonstration on household economics. Mrs. Spicer reported that plants and flowers were sent to members ill in the hospital. Mrs. Hnatiuk, Red Cross and Home Economics handicrafts, told of the talk by Sister Eunice of all the subjects given her pupils on home economics. The Grande Prairie W.I. won the cup this year for Handicrafts, giving credit to two of our members for this honour. She was unable to get a full report on Red Cross work but mentioned the blood donor and T.B. Clinics, in which the Institute's members took an active part.

Mrs. Kowensky, radio and publicity, reported that ten broadcasts were done this year. Two of those were done by our president, a recording of Miss Christmas tour through Canada on behalf of the Women's Institute of Britain. Letters of thanks were written to C.F.G.P., Canadian Utilities and the Herald-Tribune.

Mrs. Swallow, War Time Price and Trade, said she had nothing of importance to report as everybody seemed to abide by the wartime regulations very well. She read parts from one their

pamphlets on children's clothing which said that in cases of extreme need a report should be sent to headquarters and they would attend to it. She also said to watch in the papers for changes in coupons.

Mrs. McFetridge, Social Welfare, reported that several needy families were cared for with boxes of clothing.

Mrs. MacMillan, on citizenship. This was a very interesting report, mentioning Miss Campbell's educational talk on venereal disease. There was also a social service lecture and pictures by Miss MacKay, Mr. Evoy on public health, Mr. Stranaki's talk on agriculture, Rev. Mr. Kitney on the youth movement, Mr. Rogers on rehabilitation of returned men. Now, with the war over, it is time for real citizenship efforts, both national and international.

Mrs. Wilson spoke on war work which was also a splendid report. 17 quilts, 12 ditty bags, 32 prs of socks and mittens, 12 lbs fur and leather, 1 quilt made and packed with the Russian relief clothing. Mrs. Patterson sincerely thanked each of the conveners for their splendid reports which, she said, showed the keen interest each one took in their work. Mrs. Carroll seconded all these reports.

Mrs. Patterson then turned the meeting over to Mrs. Carroll, who, on taking the chair, asked for the nominating committees report. When the slate of officers was read Mrs. Swallow moved and Mrs. Hnatiuk seconded that the slate stand as read. Mrs. Patterson returned to the chair, thanked the nominating committee, said a few words on how pleased she was to see most of the officers from last year continuing, and welcomed the new ones. The new slate of officers would be as follows: Mrs. Patterson, Pres.; Mrs. Wishart and Mrs. Spicer, Vice-Pres.; Mrs. MacDonald, Secy.; Mrs. Flanagan, Treas.; Mrs. Bell, Mrs. Wilson and Mrs. MacMillan, Directors; Mrs. Swallow and Mrs. Ireland, Auditors; Mrs. Bishop, Mrs. Miller, Mrs. Hnatiuk, Mrs. McFarlane, Mrs. Wilson and Mrs. McFetridge, Conveners Standing Committees

New business. Nominating of program committee: Mrs. Bishop, Mrs. Miller, Mrs. Hnatiuk, Mrs. McFetridge, Mrs. Bouchor with Mrs. Wilson as convener were nominated. Suggestions for program asked for and many given. Moved by Mrs. Kowensky and seconded by Mrs. Miller to allocate \$5.00 to Mrs. Spicer and Mrs. McFetridge to buy Christmas cheer for hospital. Subscriptions were taken for Home and Country magazine. The roll call was answered with many interesting suggestions for Christmas. \$3.00 was given the secretary for stamps.

While a delicious lunch was being prepared by the hostess assisted by Mrs. Manley and Mrs. O'Brien, Mrs. MacDonald read an article by Miss Christmas on her tour through Canada, the wonderful hospitality of the Canadian people and the grand work done by the Women's Institute.

The treasurer's report followed, showing a balance as at the end of Dec of \$46.11. Receipts in January were \$14.61, expenses \$61.25, balance \$17.46. Mrs. Swallow seconded this report.

Correspondence consisted of a letter of acknowledgement and thanks for a cheque in the amount of \$25.00 for the Pearcy boy and three letters from sailors who received ditty bags at Christmas; their thanks and gratitude surely proved this to be a worthwhile effort.

Mrs. Patterson read parts from a newspaper clipping of work done for the Navy League, showing that the Women's Institute contributed about ¾ of to this worthy cause. She also spoke of a letter which she received from Mrs. MacMillan, constituency convener, in connection with Handicraft, urging that a good display of work be ready for exhibit. Mrs. Wishart very graciously thanked Mr. Balfour for his most interesting talk and expressed the appreciation of all present.
